Across the Divide

Building Dialogue in Israel; Rebuilding Jewish Life in Ukraine

At this critical juncture in our Jewish State's history, where voices of dissension, disunity and divisiveness are clamoring to be heard, it is important to keep in mind that much more unites Israel than divides it.

At the vanguard of building national unity is the Schechter Institutes in Jerusalem, who, forty years ago, introduced the notion of dialogue and religious pluralism into every Schechter curriculum, classroom and program, the effects of which reverberate throughout Israel today:

- with our close to 2,000 MA graduates working to plant the values

These quiet heroes are not only defending their country, they have also chosen to practice their Judaism during these challenging times, in their synagogues, schools, seminar retreats and Camp Ramah Ukraine.

Letter from the Chairman

Dear Friends,

The situation in Israel is very troubling to all of us no matter where we stand on the political spectrum. As the Talmud says in the Tractate of Yoma, the Second Temple was destroyed due to senseless hatred. As a result, we were exiled for 2,000 years. What we are witnessing today is similar conflicts within the Jewish people in Israel. In this environment, support for Jewish democracy and pluralism is key to helping everyone understand the viewpoints of "the other" and finding ways to reconcile conflicting views in a manner respectful to all. By educating children and adults in the beauty of their Jewish heritage, Schechter helps to bridge these kinds of divides.

Jewish pluralism and democracy are the essence of our mission. In all of our activities, we attempt to both raise the level of knowledge of and appreciation for Judaism and to stress tolerance for different ways of practicing Judaism. We support these concepts in many ways.

For children, there is TALI which brings Judaism into the secular Israeli school system and educates over 65,000 children and 3,000 teachers each year, as well as preparing pedagogic materials for hundreds of non-TALI schools and pre-schools in the Israeli school system.

For families, we train rabbis who serve in pulpits, community centers, hospitals and other areas throughout Israel (and Europe) and spread Judaism through their actions and teaching.

For adults, we offer degree and non-degree courses at the Schechter Institute of Jewish Studies and the Schechter Rabbinical Seminary in Jerusalem and Neve Schechter in Tel Aviv, as well as online in Hebrew and English. Neve Schechter also brings pluralistic Judaism to more than 50,000 people per year through its cultural programs including Jewish art, classes, music, book clubs and holiday programming.

Our work spreading pluralistic Jewish values isn't limited to Israel. TALI has prepared teaching materials for Jewish day and supplemental schools throughout South America and in eight European languages. In the Ukraine, we run Hebrew and day schools, Camp Ramah Ukraine and, together with Masorti Olami, four synagogues throughout the country. In the midst of the war, we help bring stability by providing aid and shelter to those displaced, helping those who want to emigrate, and maintaining Shabbat and holiday celebrations as well as all life cycle events.

We are happy to send you our Annual Report so that you can see in detail just how we are fulfilling our mission.

We hope that you will continue to support us in spreading Jewish knowledge and Jewish pluralism throughout the State of Israel and the Jewish world.

Letter from the President

I agree with every word in the letter from our Chairman, Saul Sanders. Since January 2023, the State of Israel has been embroiled in a huge conflict, which has pitted communities, friends and families against each other.

Yet, as I have pointed out elsewhere (*Responsa in a Moment*, Vol. 4, chapter 17), the Jewish ideal has always been to strive for unity without uniformity.

As for unity, we have learned in *Midrash Tanhuma* (ed. Buber, *Nitzavim*, pp. 48-49): "According to the universal custom, if one takes a bundle of reeds, will he be able to break them at one stroke? But if he takes them one by one, even an infant can break them. *So too you find that Israel will not be redeemed until they become one bundle..."*.

But unity does not mean uniformity! As we have learned in the tractate of *Berakhot* 58a: "Our Rabbis taught: *If one sees a multitude of Jews, he says: 'Blessed is He who discerns secrets' – for the mind of each is different from that of the other, and the face of each is different from that of the other"*. In other words, we actually recite a blessing to God for having created people who are different from each other in their ideas and appearance!

As Saul Sanders pointed out, pluralism is one of the main Jewish values stressed in the dozens of programs run by the Schechter Institutes, which now teach and reach 125,000 children and adults every year.

But how do we teach pluralism in practice?

- Our MA graduate Nahal Cohen fosters Jewish-Arab dialogue as Director of Akko's Mediation Center for Dialogue in the Community (see page 4 in this report).
- TALI is now developing a curriculum to teach pluralism throughout the Israeli public school system (see pages 5 and 17), while continuing to run the incredibly successful *Dialogue and Identity* project for 1,200 Jewish and Arab Israeli children (see page 17).
- The Schechter Rabbinical Seminary continues to run the pioneering Ashira program, which teaches adults how to chant the services in four tracks; both the teachers and the students come from every denomination in Judaism (see page 15).
- And Neve Schechter now attracts every type of Tel Avivian secular and traditional, young and old, veterans and new immigrants from Ukraine and Russia – to its dozens of classes, concerts and art programs.
- In order to expand our message of pluralistic Judaism throughout the State of Israel and the Jewish world, we have recently hired talented new staff members, including Rabbi Matt Berkowitz as Vice President of the Schechter Institutes, Inc.; Rabbis Chaya Rowen Baker and Arie Hasit as the "Dean Team" of the Schechter Rabbinical Seminary (see pages 6 and 7); Dr. Marva Shalev Marom as the new incumbent of the Golinkin Chair in TALI Jewish Education (pages 11 and 17); and Bar Yerushalmi as Curator of the Neve Schechter Art Gallery (page 9).

Crossing the Great Religious Divide

Nahal Cohen, 37, Director of *The Mediation Center for Dialogue* in the Arab-Jewish city of Akko, Schechter MA graduate in the Maccabi Program for Community Leadership

"To be able to see the world as it is, not as you fear it might be, let faith extinguish the fear." Nahal Cohen's WhatsApp contact information provides a poignant first clue as to who this woman is. So does her picture. She is definitely Orthodox, donning a prominent head covering. She is a devout believer, but one who is courageously committed to co-existence with Israel's Arabs.

"I call myself 'Settler Lite,"" she explains with a wry smile. Nahal grew up in Bet Horon, a small communal settlement north of Jerusalem. She attended a religious girl's high school in Ofra, a northern West Bank town in Samaria. She met her husband in the religious Zionist youth movement, Bnei Akiva. In 2011, they moved as a family to Akko, a coastal city north of Haifa with a historical mix of Arab and Jewish residents.

"We joined the 'Garin Torani' (a group of young, religious Zionists) to help strengthen the Jewish presence in Akko," she explains. At one time, Akko's "new" city (as opposed to its ancient walled city) was almost entirely Jewish, but today, 60% of the residents are Arab.

Ideology aside, the experience has radically changed Cohen's perception of Arabs. "Growing up, I only saw Arabs 'on the other side of the fence.' For me, an Arab was a 'potential terrorist." All that has changed over the past twelve years. "Once 'the other' becomes your neighbor, it is impossible to see them as your enemy. He or she simply becomes a person. A good or bad person."

Indeed, Nahal feels Israel's biggest enemy today "is our ignorance of 'the other,' be it Arab-Jew, Secular-Religious, Right or Left. Ignorance quickly leads to fear and hatred." Focused on the community, this activist has worked extensively with youth-at-risk, as well as teaching mainly Russian immigrants in the national conversion program for Israeli soldiers.

Two years ago, she was chosen to direct Akko's Mediation Center for Dialogue in the Community. Together with three professionals and an additional thirty volunteers, Nahal's team works with thousands in the city. The job is demanding, and can often be lonely. "It's very nice to talk about 'co-existence,' as my Tel Aviv friends are wont to do. But it's not always about peace and love. It's about trying to give space to every voice, in a community pot that more often than not, spills over."

Nahal knows how difficult and paradoxical real dialogue is. "When you allow yourself to listen to a narrative different than your own, the fear of losing your own personal compass, your center, is very real." But she is willing to take those risks and fervently hopes that many more Israelis like herself will leave their comfort zones to engage in genuine dialogue.

Can Pluralism Be Learned, like Math and English?

Orit Bar-Or, Director of Formal Education for TALI elementary schools, former Principal of the TALI Hod Hasharon School

Orit Bar-Or is an experienced educator. For thirty-five years she has been integrally involved in shaping the lives of thousands of young Israelis, the vast majority of them in the TALI school system. Principal of the veteran TALI Hod Hasharon School for fifteen years, she is passionate about the principles and values that TALI education embraces.

"TALI stands for Enriched Jewish Studies, but I needed to connect my Judaism to my core values of Zionism and Democracy," explains Orit. These 'three legs' formed the educational pillars for the nine years that Orit had her students (1st-9th grade) under her wing.

Orit learned these values at home. Both her parents are from Iraq. They met in Israel and settled in Hod Hasharon, a fertile region a bit inland from Herzliya. Instilling in her a love of Israel and family, she remembers navigating between the "New Jew" returning to the Land of Israel and the "Traditional Jew" of her Iraqi ancestors. Introduced to TALI education early on in her professional career, Orit realized it was the perfect framework to "connect" these two disparate identities.

"Connections" are paramount to Orit's holistic philosophy of education. "Scholastic achievement will come, but first we must ensure that our students feel a sense of belonging – to their families, the school community and the community at large. With a positive sense of self comes an inner strength and well-being," explains Orit.

In 2018, after fifteen years at the helm of TALI Hod Hasharon, Orit retired. But only from the school. Today, she is Director of Formal Education at TALI headquarters in Jerusalem, overseeing the pedagogical work taking place in all TALI schools around the country.

Topping her agenda is *Meorot* – an educational incubator of six model TALI schools chosen for their excellence and commitment to TALI values. *Meorot* principals and lead staff are involved in creating a revolutionary three-year model for teaching pluralism in schools throughout Israel.

"TALI is building a pluralism curriculum that will take the discipline of pluralism out of the theoretical realm of words into the practical world of measurable acts of behavior. Just as in math and language, students are required to demonstrate specific skills, we want to prove that pluralistic behavior can be taught and measured empirically," explains Orit.

To this end, Dr. Nurit Novis-Deutsch, a Schechter graduate now on faculty at Haifa University's Department of Education, has been hired to study the effects of the *Meorot* pluralism curriculum on a group of 5th graders. "This is ground-breaking research, the first of its kind undertaken anywhere in the world," says Orit.

In Israel's divisive climate of 2023, TALI's new pluralism program aims to teach its youngest citizens skills in mutual respect and listening – just what the Jewish State needs most these days.

The Schechter Rabbinical Seminary proudly introduces two extremely talented SRS graduates set to lead the school in the coming years: Dean, Rabbi Chaya Rowen Baker and Associate Dean, Rabbi Arie Hasit.

Building on Strong Foundations

Rabbi Chaya Rowen Baker, 46, new Dean of the Schechter Rabbinical Seminary, SRS-ordained in 2007, served for sixteen years as rabbi of Jerusalem's Ramot Zion Synagogue and the last seven years also as SRS Coordinator of Practical Rabbinics

Rabbi Chaya Rowen Baker makes everything seem so easy. At the ripe age of 30, she became the first rabbi to be hired by Ramot Zion, Jerusalem's flagship Conservative synagogue. A congregation founded in the early 1970s by a group of North American Conservative rabbis, these idealistic leaders laid the foundation for Conservative Judaism in Israel, establishing the Bet Midrash (today's Schechter Rabbinical Seminary), the TALI Education Fund and Ramot Zion.

Through her strong leadership skills, boundless commitment to community and keen empathy for people, Rabbi Chaya succeeded in making Ramot Zion a significant neighborhood force and a resource to people in search of a Jewish connection. "When looking for Jewish input, residents know to come to us, be it for celebrations or in sorrow. Local institutions know that they need to consult with Ramot Zion on any major planning processes or events," she explains.

As Dean of SRS, Rabbi Chaya wants to develop "creative and smart leaders who will strengthen innovative and committed Judaism." She envisions opening programs aimed at reaching a wider spectrum of Israel's population and building strategic partnerships with other institutions. "I want to create specialty study niches in adult and child education and community building, using the successful *Ashira* Jewish music program as a model.

"Another potential market are NOAM (Masorti youth group) graduates. We are anxious to reach them with SRS study programs, either in NOAM pre-army programs or in Israeli universities," explains Rabbi Chaya. A shortage of rabbis in Israel has prompted SRS to work on a unique training program for non-rabbinic community leaders. "We aim to provide them with the skills needed to lead their congregations. Naturally, some participants from these SRS programs will funnel into the rabbinical program."

Working closely for the past seven years with outgoing Dean, Rabbi Avi Novis-Deutsch, as coordinator of practical rabbinics at SRS, Rabbi Chaya gained invaluable experience mentoring students during their internships. "Those years re-kindled my passion for learning and being immersed in a Bet Midrash community. I realized how much I love teaching rabbis, helping them become the best leaders they can."

Within the Bet Midrash, Rabbi Chaya will focus on developing rabbinical skills for the community, building on the positive work that Rabbi Arie Hasit began in the Bet Midrash last year. "We want to give Bet Midrash graduates the ability to build and strengthen vibrant Jewish life in Israel, one that is honest and committed to advancing pluralism in Israel. The way we start is by building a microcosm of our ideal community right within the walls of our own Bet Midrash."

The Heart of the Matter: the Bet Midrash

Rabbi Arie Hasit, 40, new Associate Dean of the Schechter Rabbinical Seminary, SRS-ordained in 2016, founding rabbi of the Egalitarian Minyan in Mazkeret Batya for six years, Associate Director of SRS in 2022-23

Rabbi Hasit feels blessed that Rabbi Chaya Rowen Baker "brought me onboard for leading SRS together." Over the years, their lives crossed at crucial periods in Arie's professional development. "I consider Rabbi Chaya my rabbi and a leading figure in my rabbinic life," says Arie. As a rabbinical student, he interned at Ramot Zion during Chaya's tenure. Before that, Chaya officiated at Arie's marriage to Sara Tova Brody.

The heart of Rabbi Arie's work will be in the Bet Midrash, where, as Associate Director, he focussed his energies last year on building community. "I see the Bet Midrash as a *kehillah* – a community – not just a place to study. Our aim is to create a caring community *within* the Bet Midrash, an organic model to prepare our students to lead congregations of their own.

Rabbi Arie comes to his new position knowing how to build community. Immediately following ordination from SRS in 2016, Arie, together with his wife and infant daughter, moved to Mazkeret Batya to become the congregation's first rabbi. This historic village near Rehovot has successfully attracted thousands of young Israeli professionals to its newer neighborhoods. "Initially, we formed a WhatsApp group of six families, rotating services in different living rooms. Six years later, our Egalitarian Minyan boasts 70 dues-paying families with a permanent location in a school," beams Arie.

In the coming year, Rabbis Chaya and Arie will take practical rabbinics one step further into the community. One day a week will be dedicated to peer learning, practicing a broad range of teaching skills including story-telling and on-site training in schools. Business and organizational skills will also be taught. Students will be required to organize seminars for the Bet Midrash as well as run small projects and lectures for the public at large, each according to his or her particular passion and strengths, all aimed at exposing wider audiences to the SRS message.

"SRS must nurture an environment of diversity, committed to making Israel a better society. Our vision is to transform the Bet Midrash into a community of diverse voices where everybody brings their Torah to the world, and by doing so, makes the world a better and more tolerant place," explains Arie.

Look out Israel! This "Dean Team" means business and they are surely out to win. "I look forward to working closely with Rabbi Hasit. Both of us are eager to do a good job, and if so, then it will be easy!" sums up Rabbi Chaya.

Living Through Two Wars and Landing on Your Feet

Maxim Melnikov, 39, Director of Kyiv's Conservative congregation, *Kehillat Masoret*, and of the MILI Charitable Foundation which funds Midreshet Schechter Jewish centers in Kyiv and throughout Ukraine

When Maxim Melnikov made his first trip to Israel from Ukraine in 2014, he was doubly lucky. First, he missed Russia's bloody incursion into eastern Ukraine and Donetsk, his home town. Second, he fell in love with the Jewish land and its people.

Maxim, a lawyer by profession and public activist by passion, today directs *Kehillat Masoret*, the largest Conservative community in Ukraine, cosponsored by Masorti Olami. "Donetsk was no longer safe and so I moved to Kyiv after returning home from Israel. At a Jewish event, I met Rabbi Reuven Stamov, then rabbi of *Kehillat Masoret* and the rest is history," he smiles.

"Fleeing the fighting in Donetsk, I put down roots with *Kehillat Masoret*. It became my new home and family in Kyiv. The wonderful people took me in and really cared for me." In return, Maxim contributed his expertise in legal matters relating to the Kehillah. Not long after, he was hired as its Director. Maxim quickly became a pillar of the community, while in parallel, immersing himself in the study of Judaism and Jewish observance.

Fast forward seven years. Russia declares all-out war on Ukraine in February 2022. Kyiv is under siege and aerial bombardment. Many of *Kehillat Masoret's* members flee the Ukrainian capital, for points west, including Europe and Israel. Maxim does not.

"I could not allow myself to leave because of the responsibility I felt towards the community," he explains. Indeed, from the onset of hostilities until today, Maxim never abandoned Kyiv. "I remained in touch with congregation members, kept an eye on our new Jewish Center/Synagogue complex and made sure nobody lacked anything."

The war rages on, but the locals of Kyiv who never left or have returned, are creating their "new normal" within the confines of war's uncertainty and danger. Maxim is just one of those quiet heroes.

"My stay in this community is connected with helping to ensure that it develops, grows and prospers." And indeed, it has in the past half year. The new synagogue complex is open, and once again, offering Shabbat and holiday programming to growing numbers of members. New staff has been hired to meet the center's demand.

For Maxim, directing *Kehillat Masoret* and the Mili Fund at times seems a higher calling. "This is my job and my life at the same time. I live for this work and can't imagine my life without it. *Kehillat Masoret* connects me to my religion, to people I care about and to the goal of building a strong pluralistic Jewish community in the heart of Kyiv."

The Notion of What Judaism Can Be

Bar Yerushalmi, 35, Curator, the Schechter Gallery, Neve Schechter Center for Jewish Culture, Tel Aviv

The ancient "Red Highway" connecting Hebron to the Dead Sea; Bees and Breast-feeding; Jewish Amulets: Resurrecting Mystical Text through Music; The Voices of Eve, Ruth, Miriam and Hamutal Breaking the Gender Barrier; Mushrooms and the Talmud on Human and Non-human Connections; 24/7 Radio Prayers.

Is there a common denominator that runs through this eclectic list of art installations? Yes. The vision of one very talented young man, Bar Yerushalmi, curator of the Neve Schechter Gallery in Tel Aviv's Neve Zedek neighborhood. Since assuming the job, Bar has upended how we see Judaism, knowledge and life itself.

His credentials are impressive. Four-year BA program at the *École des Beaux-Arts* in Paris. MA in Curating earned in London as well as an Internship at the Tate Modern. A year at a commercial gallery in Melbourne, with break-out projects upon his return to Israel in 2017.

Bar arrived at Neve Schechter in January 2022 with little or no Jewish background. "From the time of my Bar Mitzvah, I distanced myself from 'Professional Judaism.' I was still connected, but with a safety-gap in place.

"Joining Neve Schechter was an important moment for me. I was not expecting it to be so meaningful, where a job can also be part of your personal journey."

He remembers his "defining moment" when Rabbi Irina Gritsevskaya, Executive Director of of Neve Schechter, sat him down at a table, with a huge volume of the Talmud separating them. "I thought to myself: We do not speak the same language. We don't come from the same world. It was the first time I had ever seen a *Daf Gemara* (page of Talmud) before... but... I understood that we would use this book to get to know one another."

With time, Bar came to realize how closely the structure of the Talmud replicated his own thought processes and curatorial work. "You think you know your problems and how to deal with them. Before Neve Schechter, I could not imagine that there was such a huge part of me – my Jewish identity – that had been left untreated. I was reminded in a beautiful way, that I belong to this body of knowledge that is part of my heritage, part of my DNA.

"What we are doing through the gallery is expanding the notion of what Judaism can be," Bar explains. This expansiveness is almost palpable in the installations Bar and his invited artists have brought to Neve Schechter. Using performance art and the medium of sound, "which is corporeal, an allencompassing physical experience," Bar is certain that the art is touching upon what people care about, "for is not the highest goal of art to connect with life and reflect upon it?

"In Israel today, we face so much divisiveness and hate. Every subject is 'loaded', especially that of religion. Neve Schechter is finding ways of opening the 'Jewish space' for more people to enter that magnificent 'treasure box,' without fear and without fear of being left out or silenced."

On June 2, 2023, 76 MA students received their degrees in a Commencement ceremony at the Jerusalem campus. Judaism and the Arts and Land of Israel Studies awarded the most degrees, with Midrash, Jews of Spain and Islamic Countries and Gender and Feminism programs following close behind.

The Kekst Faculty Fellow for 2023–25, in memory of longtime Board Member Gershon Kekst z"l, is Dr. Ronit Steinberg. A lecturer in Art History and Modern Jewish Art, she received her PhD from the Hebrew University. Dr. Steinberg is department head and academic advisor for both the Judaism and the Arts and Gender and Feminism tracks. Her book, *The Visual Arts in Jewish Society*, a publication of The Open University, will soon be published.

Kekst Fellow Leads Successful Gallery Course

Dr. Ronit Steinberg led "Art Tours," an intensive six-day course that immersed students in Israel's art scene. Visiting art galleries and museums in Tel Aviv and Jerusalem in Spring 2023, the students met with artists and curators in an eclectic encounter of contemporary Israeli art and some older pieces. Very well received, the course will be offered again in 2024.

Creating Art Inspired by Jewish Texts

Schechter has introduced an art studio experience alongside Jewish text study. Seventeen students were enrolled in a yearlong academic course that offered analog photography first semester and sculpture and installation art second semester. A resident artist worked alongside Schechter faculty.





YAMAH – Developing Creative Leadership

Over the years, Schechter has been at the forefront of establishing interdisciplinary graduate programs designed to foster educational leadership in Israel, including the Marpeh CPE program, Mishlei Academic Bet Midrash, Maccabi Community Leadership and more. Welcome YAMAH, Hebrew acronym for *Creativity, Educational Leadership and Jewish Renewal*. The program run by the Graduate School and TALI, is headed by **Dr. Marva Shalev Marom**, who has joined the Schechter faculty and is the new incumbent of the Golinkin Chair in TALI Jewish Education. Inter-Religious Classes Promote Dialogue

- The Center for Dutch-Israeli Studies (CIS) partnered with Schechter to offer The Written Law and the Oral Law:
 Where Judaism and Christianity Differed to Dutch pastors.
 The online course was taught by adjunct faculty member Rabbi Dr. Vernon Kurtz. The Center hopes to bring groups of Dutch clergy to Schechter for classroom chavruta in 2024.
- A field trip course on Sufism taught by Prof. Paul Fenton, a leading expert on Islam, was offered by Schechter's Adult Education Department in Spring 2023. An additional course taught by Dr. Ron Kronish explored Christian and Muslim relations.

Trauma, Hope and Jewish Sources

A new multi-disciplinary research group made up of leading Schechter faculty members from various disciplines has been formed to study *Trauma and Hope in Jewish Sources*. A book and international conference is planned upon completion of the study.

Zoom Lectures Enrich Hundreds

Schechter's Continuing Adult Education marked another successful year as online and in-person learning attracted new and varied audiences. The program, in English and Hebrew, continued to grow in 2022-23, with 38 courses reaching 400 students in Israel, Europe, Australia and North America.

- 40 special needs students in four Batei Midrash around the country and online
- 10 rabbis in advanced weekly Halakhah studies
- 180 students in WhatsApp daily Mishnah study group, up 20% from last year

JTS Students Spend Year at Schechter

Ten JTS rabbinical students are studying Talmud, Halakhah and Hebrew literature with their Israeli counterparts in Jerusalem for the 2023-24 year, as well as taking additional academic electives through the Graduate School. The year in Israel also includes field trips around the country. In 2022-23, twenty students from JTS, Ziegler, the Seminario and Schechter toured Israel together.

Two New Rabbinical Students from Ukraine

Lev Kleyman leads Midreshet Schechter's Chernivtsi Aviv congregation in Ukraine. De facto rabbi for years, he, together with members of his community, took in refugees fleeing the fighting in 2022, providing a safe haven for thousands. Joining Lev is Oleg Karsany, originally from Kharkiv, who spent six years in Israel before returning to Ukraine in 2006. Oleg was forced to move to Chernivtsi when Russia attacked Ukraine. He has become an active member of Kehillat Aviv. The men, unable to leave Ukraine, began their rabbinical studies online and in-person when Rabbis Avi Novis-Deutsch and Irina Gritsevskaya were in Chernivtsi in February 2023.



Ashira Music Partnerships Spread the Magic

The *Ashira* Jewish Music program to train lay prayer leaders, now in its sixth year, is having a substantial impact on spiritual life in Israel by making prayer more accessible to countless Israeli worshipers. This year, in addition to the annual winter and summer prayer leaders course, a new two-year course, **T'filat Kol Peh**, is deepening theoretical and practical knowledge in Ashkenazi liturgy. Fourteen students are enrolled in the program, sponsored jointly by the Hadar Institute. **Zamru**, a joint SRS-Fuchsberg Center scholarship program, offers advanced liturgy and prayer study to a select group of *Ashira* graduates. This year, the group gave three public concerts with close to 200 Jewish music aficionados attending.

Community Activists Ordained at 32nd Ordination

Rabbis David Perlman Paran and Adam Berman were ordained at a moving ceremony in Jerusalem in December 2022. Perlman Paran, founding rabbi of the Darchei Noam Synagogue in Pardes Hannah, is known as the "Green Rabbi" for emphasizing sustainability in his work. Berman directs the Jewish Agency Partnership 2Gether Arava-Australia project. The two join 108 Schechter colleagues leading communities in Israel, Europe and the Americas.

Teaching Sustainability and Shmita

"Making Torah relevant" has always guided the SRS curriculum and this year, thanks to a generous grant from **Keren Kayemet L'Yisrael**, courses in "Sustainability, the Environment and Shmita" are being offered to all SRS students.

Meorot Program Aims to Put Pluralism into Practice

Meorot, an educational incubator of six model TALI schools, is working to transform pluralism into a discipline that can be taught to elementary school students. In the program's first year, teams from each school met regularly to create a three-year curriculum for teaching pluralism in schools throughout Israel. Dr. Nurit Novis-Deutsch, a Schechter graduate on faculty at Haifa University's Department of Education, is studying the effects of the Meorot curriculum on 5th graders. (See TALI profile, page 5.)

New Incumbent of Golinkin Chair in TALI Jewish Education

Dr. Marva Shalev Marom, the new incumbent of the Golinkin Chair in TALI Jewish Education, earned her PhD from the Stanford Graduate School of Education. Working extensively with disadvantaged communities, she created a music program for Ethiopian Israeli and Arab youth in Jaffa. Her dissertation researched four Israeli Ethiopian female students on their perceptions of religion, race and the definition of Jewishness in Israel. Marom recently joined the Schechter faculty to head the new TALI-Schechter YAMAH MA program – Hebrew acronym for Creativity, Educational Leadership and Jewish Renewal (See page 11.)

Dialogue and Identity Teaching More Teachers

The veteran co-existence program, *Dialogue and Identity*, now in its 17th year, teaches shared religious values to 1,200 Arab and Jewish children in 38 schools. This year, an additional 30 teachers learned in the program. A second national Songfest took place in May with a thousand Arab and Jewish students coming together in songs of peace and co-existence.

Neve Schechter Prize for Contemporary Israeli Art

Neve Schechter awarded the Fourth Annual Prize for Contemporary Israeli Art, sponsored by the Yehoshua Rabinovich Foundation, to singer and songwriter Shay Tzabari, in September 2023. Tzabari's works fuse familial and tribal roots with Jewish texts and melodies into a dialogue between traditional and contemporary Israel.

Hineni Study for Young Adults

Hineni, a year-long Bet Midrash program for young adults aged 20-32, completed its first year with eight mini-courses, three workshops and a retreat dedicated to Jerusalem's culture scene. The new program elicited high marks from the entire student cohort.

Adult Coming-of-Age Ceremony

This year, the twelve actors, dancers, musicians and theater directors of the **Artists' Incubator** turned their creative energies to the Bar/Bat Mitzvah. Studying the history, theology and sociology of this life event ritual, the group created their own "adult coming-of-age ceremony." The performance, which took place in the Atid Sanctuary in May, received very positive feedback.

Neve Schechter hosted many music events sponsored by Dr. David Braun, in honor of his late father, Dr. Richard Braun z"I, including: Six-weeks of Friday noon Kabbalat Shabbat music with a flea market, 600 people, June/ July 2023; Bene Israel Indian traditional music and food, Tu Bishvat, 120 participants, February 2023; Acoustic Groove live music evenings, 200 participants, January 2023; Live music at 20 holiday, literary and gallery events.

Camp Ramah Ukraine Welcomes Schechter Leaders

Camp Ramah Ukraine celebrated its 31st season this summer under the dark cloud of war, but for the 125 children and 36 staff, they were in "Sunny Valley" in western Ukraine, the venue for this year's 12-day respite from the trauma that many of the children have experienced these past eighteen months. No wonder Camp has a waiting list! Additional donations next year will allow more children to experience camp.

A high point of the camp was the emotional Shabbat encounter between campers and members of a high-level Schechter delegation, led by Vice Chair of Schechter's Board of Directors, David Kekst, who was visibly moved by the entire experience. "I saw a video of Camp Ramah Ukraine, and was transfixed. Kids who looked like they were from Camp Ramah in Ojai having the time of their lives, but living through a horrific war where civilians are being targeted and homes destroyed. I wanted to go there to show the campers that they are part of something larger, a worldwide Jewish community that doesn't leave anyone behind."

Lighting Up the Holidays

A stream of Schechter Israeli educators, led by Executive Director **Rabbi Irina Gritsevskaya**, made frequent visits to Midreshet Schechter communities in Ukraine this year, lifting spirits, sharing Jewish knowledge and providing much needed supplies to community members.



Chanukah: Warm blankets, clothing and even generators were distributed in Kyiv, Chernivtsi, Odessa and Kharkiv. Purim: Rabbi Avi Novis-Deutsch led the Megilah reading and taught classes at Kehillat Aviv in Chernivtsi and Rabbi Irina Gritsevskaya brought laughter and learning to Kyiv's Kehillat Masoret. In Odessa's Kehillat Tiferet, a "Hamantaschen Bake" stole the show. Passover: Seders were held in Kyiv, Chernivtsi and Odessa, drawing more than 300 people. In Kyiv, the seder, led by Rabbi Gritsevskaya, welcomed thirty Jews from Kharkiv, who traveled long distances in dangerous conditions to be able to participate.

Teitel Camp Seminars Set a High Bar

The Ben and Harriet Teitel Camp Ramah Yachad Ukraine Staff Seminars are a crucial educational element of Camp Ramah Ukraine. War could not dampen the great success of the seminars, held at this year's camp site, Sunny Valley, in western Ukraine in December 2022 and in advance of the camp in late July.

Teachers Seminar and Online Learning

Despite the ongoing war in Ukraine and the danger in traveling from cities under attack, the five-day Teachers Seminar, celebrating 31 years of training Jewish leaders, attracted 40 educators to its annul retreat. Teachers, community activists and camp counselors from five Ukrainian cities benefitted from intensive study, pedagogical training and professional exchanges, which they passionately took home to their communities. The educators also participated in two online courses in Jewish Philosophy and Hasidism that ran from October 2022-February 2023. The learning is funded by The Claims Conference and The Pincus Fund for Jewish Education.

Jerusalem Campus Renovation and **Endowment Campaigns Propel Schechter Growth**

Over the past year (September 2022-August 2023), the capital campaign to fund our Jerusalem Campus Renovation Project has thus far raised \$3.5 million out of \$4 million needed.

An unprecedented \$2,025,000 in new endowments were received over the past year to ensure the long-term stability and strength of our Institutes.

Schechter raised \$5,289,500 to fund the programs and operating expenses of our Graduate and Rabbinical schools, TALI Education Fund, Neve Schechter

and Midreshet Schechter in Ukraine. This fundraising has ensured the stability of the four Schechter non-profits as they conduct outstanding programs and expand their impact throughout Israel and in Jewish communities around the globe.

The current Israeli government took office in late December 2022. To date, Schechter has not been adversely affected. In fact, in 2022-23, we secured and/or increased government and municipal funding in a number of areas. We are working closely with officials in the Ministries of Education. Culture and Diaspora Affairs to maintain that funding.

Tragically, the more than 18-month war in Ukraine has left the battered country in an on-going state of emergency. The need to care for refugees fleeing war zones and aid



those still living under direct attack goes unabated. Many people responded once again to our Camp Ramah Ukraine Emergency Appeal in June 2023. With this crucial support, Midreshet Schechter was able to expand the Camp from 90 campers in 2022 to 125 campers this year.

A first-ever mission to Camp Ramah Ukraine took place August 3-6, 2023 (see page 21). The mission inspired both participants and the camp community alike, with messages of support and solidarity.

We can only express our deepest appreciation for the strong commitment demonstrated by our donor community to our mission and programs. Our diverse funding community includes private individuals in North America and Israel, family foundations, JAFI and KKL, Jewish Federations, and the Israeli government. We are grateful to our many friends and partners and thank them for their sustained generosity.

Campus Renovation on Schedule

The Jerusalem Campus renovation, including the Harvey L. Miller Family Library and Administration Building, is replacing the building's sixty-year-old aging infrastructure to provide a contemporary workspace, full handicapped accessibility and updated library facilities and conference rooms. Demolition of internal walls, ceilings and floors, construction of the elevator shaft and installation of steel support beams in the entrance lobby have proceeded on schedule through mid-September, with completion set for May 2024. Renovation of the Classroom Building lower level, scheduled for completion by July 2024, will house an art studio and a significant part of Schechter's Judaica library collection. The renovation includes the installation of 8,000 sq. ft. of photovoltaic panels on the roofs of both campus buildings to provide all the institution's electrical needs, as well as an upgrade of Schechter's communications capacity for distance and hybrid learning.

a testimony to the resilience of the Jewish people and the power of Judaism to provide light in a time of darkness."

The group returned home inspired to share their experiences with their communities. David Kekst looks back on the visit: "Reading the latest news of the fighting in Ukraine, I prayed that these wonderful children, campers, counselors, staff members and the soldier who visited with us, are staying safe. Braving all the horrors and challenges, these young campers come from all over Ukraine and from outside Ukraine simply because they love it."
